"May there be prosperity! Let it flow over the thresholds!"

February 1 is Saint Trifon's Day. It is celebrated by wine growers, tavern keepers and gardeners to whom the Saint is a patron. The traditions followed to celebrate St. Trifon's day vary across regions in Bulgaria.

In the Plovdiv region, people go to their vineyards with "backlitza" (a bottle made of wood and filled with red wine) and cut a set of select, most fertile grapevines with a sharpened "koser" (a knife), water them with wine and bless them so they would bear a lot of grapes.

In Malgarsko (Eastern Thrace), while walking around the vine stumps, you may hear a man crying out "Trifon, where are you?", while another replies "I cannot see you under the grapevines!". The first man answers "Next year, I will not be able to see you at all!"

In Rodopsko, the woman of the house strikes a pillar with an axe and cries out: "Can you hear me, Trifon?". An answer comes from inside the house: "Oh, I cannot hear you because my ears are filled with butter and cheese".

These customs are called a "Trifonosvane", a call to fruitfulness.

In Northern Bulgaria (Ruse, Veliko Tarnovo, Pleven region, Vrasta region), the King of the Grapevines is chosen on St. Trifon's Day. The chosen King then gives a blessing: "May we be blessed with a good harvest!". Once the feasts in the vineyards have finished, the people go back to the village carrying their bagpipes, violins and drums.



Area planted with grapevines¹ and number of enterprises for the production of wine from grapes in Bulgaria in 2015



Production of wine


3 500 persons were employed in the production of 136 596 thousand litres of wine from grapes in 2015.














Imports and exports of wine from fresh grapes (incl. fermented grape must) for the 2011 - 2015 period













Imports for the January - October 2016 period (Preliminary data)

Exports for the January - October 2016 period (Preliminary data)


Top 3 trade partner countries




Spanish wine is the most popular imported wine in Bulgaria.

Retail trade and consumption of wine




There were 2 310 retail sales outlets for alcoholic and soft drinks in Bulgaria in 2015
